GOSPEL REFLECTION: Matthew 3:1-12

The Advent season easily has us focus on the coming of the *infant* Messiah. However, John the Baptist's words clearly refer to the coming of an *adult* Messiah. Everything about John the Baptist challenges established religious authorities. He emerged from the desert, he wore tattered clothing and ate locusts and wild honey. John calls people not only to repentance, but to an integrity that bears the fruit of love and mercy.

1. How would we respond to a John the Baptist today? Who among us really wants to make changes in her/his life?
2. In what ways does our behaviour show that we repent and believe God's Good News?
3. Much in life is urgent, but not essential. Do John's words feel urgent or essential?

GESTURES AND BODILY POSTURE DURING THE MASS –

The following is from guidelines sent out from Bishop Hagemoen

I. Posture for the Eucharistic Prayer

The norm within the Diocese of Saskatoon is that the faithful should kneel immediately following the Sanctus (Holy, Holy) and until the Mysterium Fidei (Memorial Acclamation).

II. During an Individual's Reception of Holy Communion

The faithful can receive either in the hands or upon the tongue. For the sake of appropriate efficiency and order, it is recommended that Communion be received standing, although one may choose to receive while kneeling. When one receives standing, the faithful are invited to make a reverent bow prior to approaching the communion minister. Communion should be always received with reverence and respect, and without the faithful feeling hurried.

III. Following an Individual's Reception of Holy Communion

There is no explicit mention in the GIRM regarding posture after one receives Holy Communion. Given this fact and noting that there is a great variety of practice on this point throughout the diocese – which represents the legitimate diversity of devotional attitudes – there will be no directive given regarding an individual's posture following receiving Holy Communion. Therefore, the faithful are free to assume an appropriate posture (i.e. standing, kneeling, or sitting) following their reception of Holy Communion. Time for a short period of "sacred silence" after all the faithful have received should be observed with the faithful either kneeling or sitting. The faithful then stand as the presider stands and says "Let us pray" prior to the offering of the post-communion prayer.
